Learning Challenge Question: What is it like here?

Week 1: Where in the world are we?

Geography LI: I can locate the school on an ariel photograph.

To know that aerial means from above and that objects look different from an aerial view. Name of the country I live in and the name of the village/town/city they live in. Identify three features of the local area on an aerial photograph and locate the country they live in on a map.

Week 2: What can I see in our classroom?

Geography LI: I can create a map of the classroom.

To represent four classroom features using objects to create a messy map and begin to use directional language to describe the location of features.

Week 3: What can we fond in our school grounds?

Geography LI: I can locate key features of the playground.

To identify four features in the school grounds and use a simple map to identify these features. Begin to use directional language (near, far, up, down, left, right, forwards and backwards) to describe direction and location.

Week 4: Where are different places I our school?

Geography LI:I can draw a simple map.

To draw three features on a map using simple shapes or symbols.

Then use directional language to describe the location of features.

Week 5: How do we feel about our playground?

Geography LI: I can investigate how we feel about the playground.

To explain how they feel about three areas of the playground and complete a questionnaire to express their opinion. Children to then summarise the results of a survey.

Week 6: Can we make the playground even better?

Geography LI: I can create a design to improve our playground.

Draw a design to improve three areas of the playground by using the results from their survey.

Knowledge

To know that the UK is short for 'United Kingdom'.

To know that a country is a land or nation with its own government.

To know the name of the country they live in.

To know that an aerial photograph is a photograph taken from the air above.

To know that atlases give information about the world and that a map tells us information about a place.

To know that a map is a picture of a place, usually drawn from above.

To know that symbols are often used on maps to represent features.

To know simple directional language (e.g near, far, up, down, left, right, forwards, backwards).
